Fortunately this is changing. There is a new movement in Israel that sees this problem and understands the importance of impacting the both young generations for a better future. One of such initiative is an exchange of students and young people between Israel and many countries in Europe. This is a great opportunity, not only to impact and change a perspective of Israel in Europe, but also to reach to the youth in Israel.

Recently, we have contacted organizations in Israel that are involved in such a movement and offered our help and cooperation. The goal is to connect youth Christians with a fresh and healthy perspective on Israel with the youth from Israel. Ten young people from Poland (5 girls and 5 boys) interacting with ten young people from Israel (5 girls and 5 boys). A week in Poland and a week in Israel. We show them Poland and they show us Israel. There is interaction, there is communication and there is a huge impact. Lives are changed and a new perspective is created. This is an excellent environment to establish real friendships with Jewish youth and create bridges between Polish young Christians and Jewish youth.

We are hoping this opportunity will open doors to the hearts of those young people. There are challenges; of course, we committed ourselves to cover the stay of those young Jewish people in Poland. We also had to find Polish youth that would not only have a heart of love towards the Jewish people, but also that would be able to cover their trip to Israel. For some of those young people this is quite a cost, but we believe that God will bless this ministry. We trust God that He has opened those doors for reason and His plan is perfect and worth serving for.

The Philosophy is to not only connect those young people but to ensure an environment that would favor a positive impact. We see the need to use the huge potential of young people and point it in the right direction. Interaction, discussion, activities with much movement, panels, and cultural exchange is encouraged rather than passive didactic learning methodology.

Youth is all about dynamic and it's great to use that potential! They want to make a change, therefore, let us allow them to do that!
